Rick's Ramblings

The Way Forward

I would like to follow up on my article from last month with a recap of remarks last month at our Annual Conference in Redlands made by our bishop of the California Pacific Conference, Grant Hagiya. He shared an overview of plans that would be presented next year at our General Conference. This would include an option recommended by the Council of Bishops on how the UMC body should proceed.

Commission on a Way Forward Report:

Bishop Hagiya presented a broad overview of the report of the Council of Bishops on the Commission on the Way Forward. He set forth objectives of the presentations and conversations scheduled on Friday such as to share openly and honestly our own position on human sexuality; to hold honest dialogue with each other without trying to convert others to our position; and to build trust with each other by engaging in deep and open dialogue now and into our future. This is a learning process for everyone. Open and honest dialogue requires that we share our deepest values without trying to change another's mind.

The Council of Bishops had a strong majority preference for the One Church Plan: In the One Church Plan, the denomination does not split and there is one unified UMC body. In this plan, all LGBTQI exclusive language is removed from the Book of Discipline (BOD); everyone will have autonomy to follow their own conscience; no vote has to be taken by any jurisdiction, annual conference or local church; Boards of Ordained Ministry (BOMs) will decide who is ordained in each conference; local churches and clergy decide who to marry; and complaints and trials on all LGBTOI violations are removed. While there are more details, this plan can be implemented without any extra layers of approvals, and no constitutional amendments are needed.

The Connectional Conference Plan: There are four types of Conferences: Central Conferences; Progressive Connectional Conference; Traditional Connectional Conference; and Unity Connectional Conference. Jurisdictional Conferences will be dismantled and each will decide which proposed conference to affiliate with. Conferences who disagree may vote to be united with a different Connectional Conference. Each Connectional Conference would create its own Book of Discipline (BOD). A General Conference Transitions Team would be created to manage the process for an organizing General Conference in 2022, which would involve approval of eight constitutional amendments. General agencies would be on their own and there would be a number of other necessary changes. This is a complex plan and achieving consensus on it would be difficult.

The Traditionalist Conference Plan: All the current language on homosexuality will remain in the BOD; Annual Conferences will have to commit that they will uphold the BOD or leave the UMC to form a self-governing body; and Bishops will have to certify that they will uphold the BOD or be charged by the Council of Bishops. The certification process would extend to conferences, clergy, and Board of Ordained Ministries in upholding the BOD. The Commission did not flesh out the legislation needed for this plan, which aims for maximum accountability.

Bishop Hagiya said that the Commission invited UMC theologians to gather and provide critical missional and doctrinal understandings for the Commission. From this came their statement on Convicted Humility: "This is an attitude which combines honesty about the differing convictions which divide us with humility about the way in which each of our views may stand in need of corrections. It also involves humble repentance for all the ways in which we have spoken and acted as those seeking to win a fight rather than those called to discern the shape of faithfulness together. In that spirit, we wish to lift up the shared core commitments which define the Wesleyan movement, and ground our search for wisdom and holiness. They are offered as a starting

point for conversation, and a reminder that what unites us is deeper and more central than what divides." Bishop Hagiya believes that John Wesley would tell us to be flexible and open to where God's Spirit is leading. Bishop Roy Sano once said to the Council of Bishops, "before you take your stance, you should tell your story," which shifted their table conversations from arguing to sharing personal stories. The Bishops seek to model this type of dialogue.

Once again the Bishop shared that there would be times set up throughout the Conference for others to listen, share stories, and offer input. Again, please feel free to set an appointment to come in and share hopes, comments, or concerns. I plan on setting up our own times of sharing of our stories and listening as we move forward.

"Thirst No More" 2018 Cal-Pac Conference

The amazing twists and turns of this year's conference kept me on my toes. The theme was "Thirst No More."

Bishop Grant Hagiya's opening talk set the tone. He spent some time on the decline of mainline churches. In 1960 over 50% of U.S. adults were members of mainline churches. Today the number is 13%!

He then spoke to us about developing a new system of discipleship, making it a verb -discipling.

Something close to my heart that he shared was the inequality still present in relationship to women clergy. Of the 730 United Methodist Churches with membership of 500 or more active members, only 30 have women as senior pastors!

Our Bishop quoted Philo: "Be kind, for everyone you meet is fighting a great battle."

He asked all of us to read "The Anatomy of Peace" before next year's conference on *The Way Forward*. He urged us to have an outward mindset with a heart at peace, not at war.

Surprisingly, the longest, most passionate discussion and voting was over whether to move the conference to San Diego starting next year. Such sessions are usually over by 4:30, but this one went past 5:15. In the end, the vote was not even close, and it ended up that we are staying in Redlands.

One morning the Hawaiian churches led the worship service. I loved the music. At one point a beautiful hula was performed and Queen Lili'uokalani's prayer of 1895 was sung in Hawaiian. In the program we had the translation. The situation was that she was imprisoned in her palace as the missionaries and military took her kingdom away from her. We were led in a liturgy of forgiveness and reconciliation.

We went to the Mission luncheon and were incredibly inspired. We met 3 new missionaries. One young man had a shirt on that was batik with the Methodist cross and flame emblem all over it. I asked him where he got it. He told me the lvory Coast. I gave him my card because he said he'd try to connect me to the makers of the fabric. I could see a Prayers and Squares quilt or two.

I attended a workshop of discipleship with a new twist. A disciple is a follower of Jesus Christ who is committed to being part of the body of Christ; becoming more like Jesus; and joining Jesus in ministry. In joining Jesus in ministry, we live a life of service and generosity. In this ministry we start out in infancy in our work and eventually mature to unity with God in Christ. They suggested we form regular huddles to discuss things like: What are the implications of understanding discipleship as a movement toward maturity? How might this affect the way we support a disciple around next steps in the journey? Help needed varies according to the stage a person is in. There is a need for churches to set up discipleship programs. Books by Phil Maynard can be of help.

The general day at conference involves morning worship in various forms, legislative meetings, workshops, lots of food, voting, talking with lots of people, miles of walking in hot and smoggy air on a gorgeous campus, inspiration and touch of confusion, and so much more.
