GUEST COLUMNby Rev. Gen Clark

Dear TUMC,

Many of you have come to know me, but since I am in the pulpit a bit more often to afford Pastor Rick some much earned renewal leave, I thought I would share a bit about what I do.

I am a fully ordained Elder in The United Methodist Church, having been ordained Full Elder in 2000. One of the phrases that defines my ministry is "The World is my Parish", claimed by John Wesley, the founder of The United Methodist Church, which led to my calling within a calling, to leave local parish ministry and serve as a United States Navy Chaplain in 2008. Since that time, I have cared for the Sailors and Marines of our great nation, and their families and the civilians who work alongside them. I currently serve at Naval Medical Center San Diego.

So what do Chaplains do? Why is it important that they are ordained pastors?

The United Methodist Church's General Board of Higher Education and Ministry explains it this way: "Chaplains perform a variety of functions. Depending on the setting, they may counsel individuals and families, advise leaders, teach an assortment of subjects, pray, lead worship, conduct rites and administer sacraments, assist clients with practical matters, and a host of other duties. In some settings, chaplains are recognizably religious. In others, they are hard to distinguish from social workers or psychologists.

Some experts argue that clients should not know what religious body a chaplain represents. In some ways, that makes sense. Clients may draw assumptions about the chaplain's religion, which could get in the way of effective ministry to the client or lead to disappointment. Those whom chaplains assist do not always belong to the chaplain's own faith tradition, either broadly or narrowly. Many clients are not religious at all.

Others argue that the people served by chaplains have the right to know who the chaplains are and who they represent. If the therapeutic value of an encounter lies at least partly in the relationship, honesty and transparency are important.

Moreover, the word "chaplain" itself carries a religious connotation. Unless the chaplain explains it away, introducing oneself as a chaplain is to claim a religious identity. That identity may be a recognizable faith tradition, or it may be a diffuse spirituality-but it's still religious.

Religious identity is part of a chaplain's usefulness to an organization, whether the chaplain is performing explicitly religious functions or not. Some clients will value it; others will not. Some may be put off by it. Regardless of how it is received, chaplains' religious identities are an integral part of who they are.

Chaplains represent the numinous. In the communities they serve, many see them as bearers of the holy. They carry the scent of the sacred.

That's why so many clients ask for prayer or a word of encouragement, even if they don't share the chaplain's religious identity. And that's why so many value the chaplain's presence at critical points in their lives, whether the chaplain performs a practical function or not. Sometimes, presence is the function.

And there are people who see the chaplain as good luck. Some might call this superstition. To a degree, that is probably true. Immature religion is pervasive. Still, there is something accurate about that. To be in the presence of the holy is healing and wholesome. To the degree that chaplains represent the presence of the holy, their presence radiates good things for people's lives. It's like a heat lamp for the soul.

In the military chaplaincy, this element of ministry is usually called "the ministry of presence." It often opens doors for other acts of ministry, but it is also valuable in and of itself-particularly if the chaplain is seen as a bearer of the sacred. Rev. Pat Barrett, who for many years served as the United Methodist Church's endorsing agent, has made this observation, "A ministry of whose presence? My own presence, to be sure, but more than my own presence. We represent the Holy One."

In my words, I am your missionary. I was raised in The United Methodist Church since birth, and continue to work to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the world, through every means that I can. Most often, this is simply and profoundly, PRESENCE. Sometimes it is offering the sacraments of Baptism and Holy Communion. Sometimes it is challenging folks with a Bible study, a prayer, or a counseling that helps them claim their own faith, challenge a long held belief, or grow in their own calling in the Kindom of God. While my calling has been to ordained ministry, what is your calling? How are you fulfilling the role of "The World is my Parish"?

Chaplains and pastoral counselors endorsed by the United Methodist Church are making a big impact in the world. The United Methodist Endorsing Agency has endorsed or approved over 1,700 active United Methodist clergy, who extend the ministry of the church to dozens of settings outside of congregations. Their ministry is a gift of mercy and blessing offered to the world in the name of Jesus Christ.

Health-care ministry represents the single largest block of chaplains, with 555 United Methodists endorsed for service in hospitals or hospices, including the Veterans Health Administration. We have endorsed 278 military chaplains, who serve the members of the armed forces, and approved 95 volunteer chaplains for military auxiliaries like the Civil Air Patrol and the Coast Guard Auxiliary. There are 151 United Methodists endorsed or approved chaplains (mostly volunteer) who serve law enforcement and emergency services. Another 53 are endorsed for prison ministry. Health and welfare ministries, such as children's homes and retirement communities, are served by 65 United Methodist endorsed chaplains. Ministering in substance abuse, family therapy, and mental-health care are 219 endorsed Licensed counselors. Also endorsed are 88 transitional interim ministry specialists, 55 clinical pastoral education (CPE) educators, 32 life coaches and 22 industrial chaplains. Another 71 are endorsed for other specialized settings.

Chaplains and pastoral counselors may work full time, part time or as volunteers. Among them are elders, deacons, and local pastors. If their ministries were funded by the church instead of their employers, it would cost the church tens of millions of dollars annually to reproduce the effect they are having. They offer the love of Christ to hundreds of thousands of people each year. Many of their constituents are experiencing life's most difficult challenges.

Please remember to pray for our chaplains and pastoral counselors, their families, their ministries, and the people they support.
