Lay Representative Report

from 2006 Annual Conference

The 20th annual session of the California-Pacific Annual Conference was held at Redlands University, Redlands, California, June 21-25, 2006. The theme this year was again "To be the cup overflowing – with grace, compassion and justice." We celebrated the 50th anniversary of full clergy rights for women in the Methodist tradition. Each session opened with the innovative and beautiful music of Ken Medema. Each morning's Bible study was presented by Dr. Marjorie Hewitt Suchocki, who gave thoughtful and clear understanding on the Gospel of John.

The Rev. Chris Cumbest and his wife, the Rev. Sheila Cumbest, reported on clean-up efforts from Hurricane Katrina in Mississippi. A video was shown that depicted the devastation from the storm and the needs it created. It showed how a group from Tennessee, working around the clock, rebuilt the Methodist church at Cleremont Harbor in one week. An offering was taken which, added to \$15,000 in reserves from Cal-Pac benevolences, came to over \$27,000 to go toward relief efforts in Mississippi.

On Friday 27 items were presented on the consent calendar for approval, after being considered in Legislative sessions. All items were approved. Included was a resolution to support the Global Aids Fund.

On Saturday, other items were considered separately that had not been approved in Legislative sessions. Of particular interest to TUMC was a recommendation from the Board of Camping that Camp Virginia near Julian be sold and the proceeds used to purchase property adjacent to Camp Cedar Glen to add more camping facilities there. There was quite a bit of discussion, with a lot of sentimental feeling about Camp Virginia, but it was pointed out that it has fallen into disrepair, was not being used very much and was a financial drain on the Conference. It was approved by 80%+.

There was also a resolution, which was approved, to reorganize our Campus Ministry into six regional boards in order to serve more campuses. A resolution on U.S. Immigration Policy for the Cal-Pac Annual Conference to call upon the U.S. Congress and the President to adopt comprehensive immigration reform was also approved.

Two proposed resolutions were referred to the Board on Church & Society: Taiwan Security, Stability and Self Determination and Support of Hotel Workers at Turtle Bay Resort in Hawaii.

We passed a Conference Budget for 2007 of \$12,447,314, a 1% increase from 2006.

Last, but not least, Pastor Randy was reappointed to TUMC for another year.

Church-wide Meetings TOPIC: Sunday Morning Worship and Church School Schedule August 13 and 27, 2006

On January 10, 2006, the Church Council discussed performing a review of the current Sunday Morning Worship and Church School schedule and offerings. The goal of this review is to determine what changes, if any, could be made to expand and improve our Sunday morning overall Worship and Christian Education offerings. The Council not only wanted to review the programs we now offer on Sundays, worship services, Church School for Adult, Children, and Youth, but also those areas where we would like to add additional opportunities for older adults and young adults.

The Church Council has scheduled opportunities for the congregation to provide their input to the process on August 13th and 27th. Two sessions will be held each day. For those attending the 9:00 am Worship service and Sunday school hour, a session will be held at 10:30 am in Room 1. For those attending the 10:30 AM service, a session will be held beginning at 11:45 am. The sessions will be held at the same times on both Sundays.

We hope that everyone will take time to attend at least one of these sessions and provide your input to the discussion of these important topics. An evening meeting will also be held on Sunday evening August 13th at 6:30 pm in Celebration Hall.




