Update on Finance

I know that Finance Committee is not high on everyone's radar for providing our mission to God, but it is a very important part of our mission! Thanks to everyone who gives financial support to TUMC we are able to have wonderful facilities and programs.

We have recently hired a new bookkeeper, Gayle Williams. Gayle is an experienced bookkeeper with a deep Christian faith and we look forward to a long working relationship with Gayle. We would also like to give a BIG thank you to Lloyd Bradshaw who was our bookkeeper in 2006. We really appreciated what he brought to our reporting and the hard work that he devoted to the church. Because we changed our accounting software and reporting with Lloyd, he had to endure many questions as we learned. Again, Thanks Lloyd!

Thanks to small increases in giving and less money being spent our budget gap of \$28,000 is closing a bit, but we are not even half way through the year yet. If you come across interesting fund raising ideas, please let me know. We are always open to new ideas.

The Food Pantry is one of our most visible missions directly to the local community. We have seen a significant increase in the number of families we serve and are now up to an average of 59 families a week. The committee has struggled to make decisions to limit the geographical area that we serve and the products we provide to the families. With these limitations in place the cost of the pantry is about \$6.50 a week per family. This mission is currently not a budgeted item from the General Fund. We are working on ways to designate certain fund raising activities to the Food Pantry so that the dedicated volunteers that do all of the work know that the money will be there when the shopping needs to be done. If you would like to help keep the Food Pantry going strong, please consider donating enough to take care of a family for a week for \$6.50 or for a month for \$26.00. Thank you for you prayerful consideration.

Thanks to all of the Finance Committee members who volunteer their time and talents to the committee, especially our Treasurer, Karen Benvenuto and Financial Secretary, Ashley Lewis. The time and energy they give to the church is phenomenal.

The Committee will not be meeting in June so please enjoy a month off and we will meet on July 17th at 7:00 p.m.

Charolette Fox is currently serving as:

<u>A Commissioner for the Community Services Commission, City of Temecula</u>. This is an advisory commission to the City Council on matters of public parks and recreation programs, with review, approval and recommendations for public art projects, park design, facility upgrades, trails development, and ADA compliance for access to the sites.

<u>A Commissioner for the County Historical Commission</u>. She receives input and responds to public concerns about the demolition, restoration and preservation of historical sites, including landscape design and maintenance of county-owned sites.

<u>An appointee by the State of California as steward for the Santa Margarita Watershed</u>. Charolette is a Director for the local Resource Conservation District. She helps to monitor and maintain all ground level water ways, preservation of ground water quality, qualifying and maintaining conservation easements, and preservation of habitat and wild animal corridors.

The statewide Natural Resources Director for the League of Women Voters, and President of the League of Women Voters of Southwest Riverside County. In these roles, she is active in legislation to preserve the quality of our environmental world.

On a personal note, Charolette is a lifetime master gardener, a certified master composter, a member of the Temecula Valley Garden Club and a shameless promoter of school gardens.


During several Church meetings this year, I have listened while everyone discussed that they would like to see more people in our worship services. I too

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CAMP GULFSIDE

WAVELAND, MISSISSIPPI Katrina April 29 - May 5 2007

Our trip started from Ontario Airport on Saturday April 28 at 2:00 p.m. arriving in Waveland at 3:30 a.m. Sunday morning via Denver, where we had a delay before continuing to New Orleans. We landed in New Orleans and left for Waveland by van.

On Sunday the 29 after three hours sleep and a good breakfast, we drove to a nearby Methodist Church at Bay St. Louis. We were greeted by an elderly man who had a World War 11 Lapel Pin which had a replica of a P-38. He told us he completed all his Flight Missions before he was 21. The Pastor, Rick, greeted us at the door. We were warmly welcomed by everyone and the service and music was exceptional. In the afternoon, we toured the area and looked at the job sights where we would be working.

Monday morning began our work week and this routine followed all week. Breakfast was 6:30 -7:00 a.m. followed by daily devotion outside in front of the Camp. We then met our team leaders, secured tools to work with and traveled to job sights. There were five teams working for Riverside and Pasadena Districts - about 50 people total.

My team (Cliff) was called "Sheldon Mudders". Sheldon was the team leader and our team including four pastors and an attorney did dry walling all week on houses. We "Mudders" finished dry walling two houses and the bedrooms in each house were painted .The remainder of the house was ready for painting.

I (Dan) was appointed to the Plumbing team "Plumb Crazy". I had a wonderful partner called Rick who was a retired IBM Executive. Our team had a young woman driver, Jennifer, who helped with plumbing. Later, I was transferred to the framing group. At this sight,, we found only a raised foundation sitting on posts and a flat wood floor. At the end of the week, the house was completely framed with trusses installed for roof. Rain prohibited us from continuing work on Friday afternoon, our last day. However, on this last day, Mennonite and Amish Groups staying at the camp sent four men who had excellent skills and they installed heavy porch beams At this Methodist Camp, four houses were nearly completed while we were there.. Along the Gulf Coast were five campsites - 35 churches provided shelter. If it were not for the efforts of the volunteer groups including Methodists from all over the U.S., these accomplishments would not have happened. Two thousand teams that served represented 33,000 volunteers and an estimated million man hours of work. There are 27,000 people still living in FEMA trailers.

It is hard to describe the aftermath of Katrina unless you can witness the area. Our week was very busy, hard work but rewarding from what was accomplished. We were humbled by the experience and grateful we had an opportunity to help.

Our thanks to the United Methodist Congregational Fund, Monk's of TUMC and Missions support. We arrived home Sunday Morning May 6 at 4:00 a.m. with a few delays along the way. A DVD is in the process of completion so this trip can be shared later.


