Realizing and Unleashing the Full Potential God Has Given All of Us.

“What strategy are we following to win people to Christ?”
“Is my church a ‘high quality’ church?”
“What does a high quality, healthy church look like?”
“What can we do to get more people to come to our church?”

When this year began, church council began to address these questions by sharing with each other our thoughts on strengths and weaknesses of TUMC, and the dreams we had for our church in the future. These discussions led us to decide that an objective assessment of the current health of our church should be conducted. Subsequent attendance by Pastor Randy, Bill Steele and Claire Chapman-Wright at a district seminar on church growth led to the identification and selection of a highly-regarded process named Natural Church Development (NCD), originated by Christian researcher and author, Christian A. Swartz, as the tool for our use.

NCD is a powerful, proven process for assessing and strengthening church health and effectiveness. This process grew out of probably the largest world-wide research project conducted on the relationship between church health and church growth. The five week NCD process has been used by more than 45,000 churches in eighteen different languages on six different continents in seventy different countries and is expected to increase the presence of love, laughter, forgiveness, answers to prayer, wisdom, spiritual power and countless other high quality factors of healthy churches. In contrast to many other approaches, NCD is not a quantitative approach (“How do we get more people to attend services?”) but focuses on the quality of church life as the key to church development. In this approach, quality, as measured in the form of eight characteristics, is the root, and the fruit is quantity (increased church attendance.) The basis for this qualitative approach is the biblical principle that a good tree produces good fruit (Matthew 7:17). Bearing all this in mind, TUMC Church Council voted unanimously to participate in NCD this year, at a cost of \$200.00 for the computerized analysis which will compare our answers against 4.2 million answers collected so far.

The first step in the NCD process was to complete a questionnaire on our present situation by Pastor Randy and thirty church members in leadership roles and active ministry. The questionnaire is known for its rigor and, to Swartz’s knowledge, provides the first world-wide, scientifically-verifiable answer to the question, “What church growth principles are true, regardless of culture or church persuasion?” The 80-question survey is designed to generate a TUMC profile on the eight quality characteristics demonstrated to clearly correlate to healthy church growth.

Each week we study three Scriptures that have come to be known as the "The Revised Common Lectionary." Basically, they are the Scriptures assigned for each Sunday's worship by an ecumenical group of scholars that has become the standard most churches use. The idea is by studying these Scriptures in one year, you get a good overview of the Christian message. One Scripture is from the Hebrew Scriptures (Old Testament), one from a Christian letter by Paul and others, and finally one Gospel reading.

Each week we let the God lead us in a variety of directions as we discuss each Scripture and try to apply it to our own lives.

Living the Questions-Adult Study**Wednesday Evenings 6:15-7:15 p.m.****Room 1**

Living the Questions is the name of a small group of United Methodist clergy out of Phoenix, AZ who have filmed a variety of scholars who are basically presenting Bible study, historical, and theological reflection in the same way that seminary students have received it over the last 50 years. Often, these perspectives rarely make it into the life of the congregation. These DVDs are designed for groups of lay persons and over the past few years at TUMC, many folks have found them "profound," "insightful," and challenging. More than one participant has said: "This is what I have been waiting to hear my whole life!"

1. **Empowering Leadership.** Leaders in growing churches concentrate on empowering/equipping other Christians for ministry. They do not use lay members as “helpers” in attaining personal goals and visions.
2. **Gift-Based Ministry.** When Christians serve in areas of their spiritual gifts, they generally function less in their own strength and more in the power of the Holy Spirit. Thus, ordinary people like you and me can accomplish the extraordinary.
3. **Passionate Spirituality.** Are the members of this church on fire? Do they live committed lives and practice their faith with joy and enthusiasm? Growing churches answer these questions with resounding “Yes!”
4. **Effective Structures.** Healthy churches continually evaluate to what extent church structures improve the self-organization and functioning of the church. Elements not meeting this standard (i.e. discouraging leadership structures, inconvenient worship service times, demotivating financial concepts) are changed or eliminated.
5. **Inspiring Worship Services.** What matters is whether worshippers feel that they encountered God during the worship service.
6. **Holistic Small Groups.** Multiplication of small groups is a universal church growth principle. They must go beyond just discussing Bible passages to applying it to daily life. In these groups people should be able to safely share personal life concerns and learn to serve others, inside and outside the group, with their spiritual gifts.
7. **Need-Oriented Evangelism.** Focus evangelistic efforts on questions and needs of non-believers.
8. **Loving Relationships.** Genuine, practical love has a magnetic power far more effective than evangelistic programs that depend mostly on verbal communication.

Studies have shown that churches aspiring to grow cannot neglect even a single one of these quality characteristics.

Results of our survey should be available in early fall. We intend to examine and understand results to extract key insights about our health, then develop and implement plans to create the impetus for near-term and long-term growth of Temecula United Methodist Church. We can do this together as members of our church family. Realizing and unleashing the full potential given by God to all of us will result in a healthy church to spread the Good News and make disciples for Jesus Christ.

Congratulations on being selected for this honor, following in the footsteps of Senator Ruben Ayala, Congressman Jerry Lewis, Lois Kreiger, John Brudin, Arthur Littleworth, Louis Fletcher, P. Joseph Grindstaff, Gerard Thibeault, and John Anderson.

Throughout your federal career, which spans nearly thirty years, you have demonstrated visionary leadership and earned the respect of water leaders throughout the State of California. Last year, the WRI Advisory Board and Faculty Council recommended that donations for the next five consecutive years should be dedicated to the new costs associated with managing the nationally acclaimed Water Resources Center Archives (WRCA), which has moved from its previous home at the University of California, Berkeley to California State University, San Bernardino and the University of California-Riverside.
