

Pastor's Discretionary Fund

From time to time, I get the question what does "Pastor's Discretionary Fund" mean? What is it used for? To answer these questions, I want to share my experience over the 30 years of my ministry regarding Pastor's Discretionary Funds. In every church, I have served, either as an Associate or as Pastor in Charge, the church had in its budget or as a special fund a Pastor's Discretionary Fund. These funds are created by the local Church to allow the Pastor of the Church to offer help to those in the community or in the congregation in some way of need. Contrary to what the name might imply this fund is not to be used by the Pastor to use for business lunch or car or travel expenses related to business. Pastors, including me, have items in their salary package that cover business expenses. Let me share a couple of examples of real stories in which I used the Pastor's Discretionary Fund.

Allison (not her name) and her husband live in their van. She does her best to hold down a job. Usually, these jobs are at a gas station convenience market. They pay minimum wages and are usually part-time. She doesn't make enough to get housing let alone have enough for food and gas. Because I have access to the Pastor's Discretionary Fund, I am able to help her from time to time to get her scrip/gift cards for gas and food. The next experience is with Joe (not his name). Joe has disabilities due to past drug use and other issues. Even with the help, he gets from other resources in our community there are times he runs short of money for food. With the fund, I'm able to get him scrip/gift cards. This bridges the gap until the next government help arrives. Finally, let me share this story. Mary (not her name) found herself in an abusive situation. She needed help with a couple of nights at a motel where she and her kids can be safe until other resources


are available. These are just three examples of the numerous ways I have been able to help those who have needs just to survive because our Church has made available to me a Pastor's Discretionary Fund.

How do we fund our Pastor's Discretionary Fund? Unlike some churches that include it in their operating budget, our congregation over the years decided to provide a special fund with gifts and offerings from you and the many church family members. We have taken Golden Basket offerings during the year; others have shared additional offerings plus the Missions Team has generously shared some of their funds available to them through the Missions Undesignated Fund. There are times when the need is greater than the resources. This is such a time in part due to the results of the Covid Pandemic fallout and in part with the uptick of inflation.

Thanks to the support of the Church Council, I'm able to continue to offer help where there is a need. In addition, the Church Council with the support of the Finance Team is exploring an additional way to help support the Pastor's Discretionary Fund. The plan is to create a way for you to help by obtaining script/gift cards that will be passed on to me so that I can use them for those seeking help. Watch for more information and the unveiling of this giving opportunity. In the meantime, I invite you to continue to offer your gifts for the Pastor's Discretionary Fund when there is a Golden Basket or direct offerings earmarked for the Pastor's Discretionary Fund. I share this invitation not instead of your giving to the ministry of the Church but as a possible additional gift. "What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if someone claims to have faith but has no deeds? Can such faith save them? Suppose a brother or a sister is without clothes and daily food. If one of you says to them, 'Go in peace; keep warm and well fed,' but does nothing about their physical needs, what good is it? In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead." James 2:14-17



Guatemala Student Scholarship



The Guatemala Government provides teachers at local schools. However, family of students are required to pay nominal school

fees, all school supplies, such as pencils, pens, paper, books, etc. The Student Scholarship fund is used for students (K-University) who are unable to attend school because their families cannot afford to pay these school expenses. Scholarships are given to children who live in an area where the "Guatemala Mission Project" has completed service projects in the highlands of Guatemala (Chichicastenango, Guatemala) Students in need of scholarship are identified by their teachers and School Director. Parents can also contact a local "Guatemala Mission Project Leader" regarding their need.

Prayers and Squares



The Prayers and Squares organization started in a United Methodist Church, is now a multidenominational prayer quilt ministry. The rules we must agree to are: the quilts are free, no charge; keep a record of all quilts given in writing and with a photo; urge sponsors to clear with prospective recipient before

submitting request form; use official labels; put prayer ties in each quilt; it's about the prayers and not so much about the quilt.
