Give Thanks

There is a song we sing in worship called "Give Thanks." The opening line is "Give thanks with a grateful heart, give thanks to the Holy One, give thanks because he's given Jesus Christ his Son." This is a response to an expression of our faith as we reflect on what God has given to us over the year. As we look back over the year, we can all say we have had ups and downs in our everyday lives. There have been stresses that have put pressure on us to make the decisions we make regarding our everyday lives. In all of this, we can point to the joys that reaffirm our hope in our God, who blesses us in ways that lift us from our sorrows and grief, giving us strength when we feel we don't know how we are going to manage the difficulties of everyday living. That gives us guidance to make decisions that will be best for ourselves and those we love and care for. This is the key message in the opening line of the song.

When we approach and relate to God in such an attitude of faith, we discover how these joys and yes miracles come to us. We see the blessings of hope and fulfillment in the strangers that greet us or share an act of kindness. We know God is present when a surprise email or card reaches us with a word of encouragement or comfort. We are uplifted when a small act on our part to offer help to another returns to us with more joy than we even knew could be possible and we didn't look for. In the letter to the Colossians Paul writes "As you therefore have received Christ Jesus the Lord, continue to live your lives in him, rooted and built up in him and established in the faith, just as you were taught, abounding in thanksgiving."

The second phrase of "Give Thanks" is "And now let the weak say, 'I am strong', let the poor say, 'I am rich because of what the Lord has done for us." Giving thanks is a verb, an action in how we live our faith. The action of praising God in Worship, the action of giving to support our Church so that we can continue to offer a place of hope and help to those who come to our doors looking for a home. The action of reaching out to care for others in our homes, neighborhoods, and the world through our support of the missions that engage with the poor and weak, the hurting and sick, the outcast and voiceless in our society. We praise God by serving in the life of our Church Home. As we look to 2023, I ask you to pray about where you might serve in the coming year. Your gifts and abilities might lead you to serve on a committee or ministry team. You might find joy serving in worship as an usher, greeter, liturgist, or in the choir. You may be stirred to help with the Children's Ministry or with fellowship ministries. Contact me if any of these or other opportunities to serve stir within you.

Giving Thanks is a main expression of our faith in response to the Grace and love God pours on us and instills in us, as demonstrated by the example of God's son, Jesus the Christ. This year during the season of Advent, noting a time of waiting and preparation for the birth of Christ, beginning the last Sunday of November and going through till Christmas we will be offering our Stewardship campaign as we anticipate a new year in which we can continue to Give Thanks to God by our giving. You will hear more about our Campaign in the coming weeks and how our giving will help us Strive to End Spiritual and Physical Hunger.

By giving thanks and responding to God's Love and Grace, we can ensure that we continue to be a strong and vital presence for Christ's love in this community and an added beacon of hope in the world.

I invite you to watch for more information and pray, another key action of our faith, in how you can offer your gifts of thanksgiving for the Mission and Ministries of Temecula United Methodist Church as we Strive to End Spiritual and Physical Hunger.



Food Pantries

Temecula residents go hungry and homeless every single day. Your generosity is what changes lives. The money collected for this golden basket will be divided evenly between the two food pantries located in Temecula.

Community Mission of Hope (CMOH) operates a food pantry that serves hundreds of families every month. They partner with over 25 grocers and food merchants in Temecula to deliver fresh fruits, vegetables, and meats to anyone in need. Their large warehouse in Temecula is where they store and distribute donations.

St. Vincent de Paul Food Pantry operates at St. Catherine of Alexandria Catholic Church in Temecula. Community food drives and donor funds feed an amazing, giant-scale collection and distribution warehouse, where their quality control staff inspects and processes truckloads of donated food every day before it is used at the food pantry.

Guatemala Student Scholarship

The Guatemalan Government provides teachers at local schools. However, families of students are required to pay nominal school fees and for all school supplies, such as pencils, pens, paper, books, etc. The Student Scholarship fund is used for students.

(K-University) who are unable to attend school because their families cannot afford to pay their school expenses. Scholarships are given to children who live in an area where the "Guatemala Mission Project" has completed service projects in the highlands of Guatemala (Chichicastenango, Guatemala). Students in need of a scholarship are identified by their teachers and School Director.

Heifer International

MISSION - They are on a mission to end hunger and poverty in a sustainable way by supporting and investing alongside local farmers and their communities.

WORK - For more than 75 years, we've helped more than 36.7 million families build sustainable

And with the right training and support, families will be able to take these assets and support their families in ways that allow them to thrive. He got married at 18, right out of high school. He and his wife had a son and a daughter. His wife passed on in 2007. He now has 3 grandchildren, one of whom is currently teaching English in Japan, plus 2 great grandchildren.

In 2011, Barry met Enny. They hit it off right away. She has been his girlfriend ever since. It is the attraction somewhat of opposites, often thought of as the spice of life. She is originally from Indonesia and is Muslim. They enjoy one another's company and are frequently together.
