#### Love Letter

When I was in elementary school, I would look forward to Valentine's Day. My mom would take me to Montgomery Wards, Sears, or even Long's Drugs to pick out a box of Valentine's Day cards. I would get home and excitedly fill out the "To:" section for all my classmates and add "From:" Rick. Valentine's Day was a fun day! Yeah, we did some of our class work, but we had some of us bring cupcakes, and there were always little bags of candy we gave out with our Valentine's cards, especially the candy hearts with the cute sayings.

Valentine's Day and, by extension, February (for commercial advantage) is now deemed the month of love, but this isn't how this day was established. The tradition of this day is based on the account of St. Valentine of Rome ministering to the persecuted Christians in prison in Rome during the third century. This person became a martyr. It was much later that this celebration honoring the compassion of this person turned to romantic love.

In the Greek definition of "love," there are many words to break down this one word we identify as "love." We say we love ice cream, our cars, our homes, our country, and our spouses in a romantic way. We also say we love God in Christ. We use one word. In Greek, it would be at least three words. Philia would be the word used for love of things and of friends. Hence the name of the city of Philadelphia, "city of brotherly love." For love of spouse or significant other is Eros, romantic, passion. The love for God, self-giving and sacrifice is Agape. The celebration of Valentine's Day has turned from Agape to Eros and Philia.

I close by sharing with you parts of the Apostle Paul's love letter for the Church at Corinth in 1 Corinthians 13. It is read at many weddings, and it is not a letter of romance but one of giving and self-sacrifice. This is what the message of Valentine's Day is really about:

If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal... If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing. Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never ends..and now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love.

# Earl Fields, Servant Volunteer of the Month February, 2023

It is with great joy that I share the life of Earl Fields. He was born in Brooklyn, N.Y., and went through schools there. He attended the City University of New York, where he earned a B.A. in sociology.

At Boys High School in Brooklyn, N.Y., Earl was part of a choral group called "The Melody Men." He also sang with the New York All City High School Chorus for 3 years. All members had to audition to join, and the competition was quite rigorous. It was an honor to be selected.

Earl's father was a Church choir director in addition to his regular daytime job, and his mother was a Soprano soloist. While in high school, he began attending the Concord Baptist Church in Brooklyn along with his three older brothers, Carl, Sylvester, and Ralph Jr. Concord became Earl's home church. His brothers also set academic examples for Earl. His oldest brother, Carl, was the first African American selected Dean of an Ivy League University, Princeton University, in Princeton, New Jersey. Sylvester was a musician, writer, arranger, and Choral conductor. Ralph Jr. was a physical-ed teacher and part time commercial musician.

His maternal grandfather was a Baptist minister, and his paternal grandfather was a deacon and a musician. All of Earl's brothers also played and sang in church settings throughout their lifetimes.

In 1958, Earl and Pauline were married at the Concord Baptist Church in Brooklyn, pastored by Rev. Dr. Gardner C. Taylor. Earl says that Pauline is and has been his light and his rock for 64 years, and by the grace of God, they have three wonderful children, Cheryl, Mark, and Leslie, all of whom have received advanced degrees.

Earl's working career has included stints at the U.S. Bureau of Customs and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. In 1970, HUD initiated a nationwide reorganization of the Department and transferred Earl from New York to its Los Angeles, California, office. In 1978 he was appointed Director of the HUD field office in Santa Ana, CA, by HUD Secretary Pat Harris. Under his direction the office became one of the top five production offices in the country.

His music life experience has included opportunities to perform in major venues e.g. Carnegie Hall in New York, The Kennedy Center in D.C., Dorothy Chandler Pavilion in L.A. In 2006, he went to Italy with the Temecula Master Chorale on a 5-city tour, which included singing for Mass at the Vatican on a Sunday afternoon.

Earl is still an active choir member and soloist, thrilling us with his amazing voice. Here at church, he was also asked to be chairman of the COVID Response Team and is on the SPRC. He was also one of the interviewers when we hired Earl Richards and Adriana Zarate.

Earl shares that God has been a major factor in his entire life. He remembers that when he was a teenager, he heard his grandfather give a sermon that changed his life. He doesn't recall exactly what the words were, but he remembers being struck deeply, and he was on his feet and ready to fully commit his life. He was baptized when he was 14 and never turned back.

To us, he says, "Keep on keeping on." He feels his life has been blessed with amazing experiences, a wonderful wife and children and now, grandchildren. He says he truly enjoys being a part of the TUMC family.
